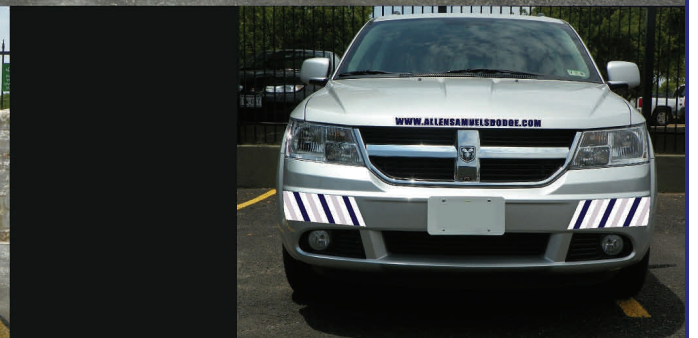

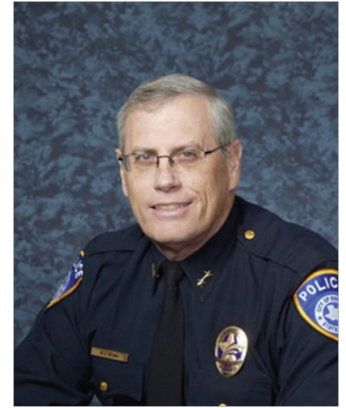

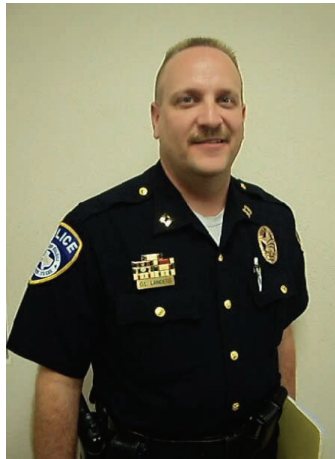
Just a few short weeks until the BBQ/Silent Auction Dinner. I hope that everyone is excited this year - should be the biggest ever.

PHYSIOGNOMY AKA FACE READING PART II

In last month's newsletter, I promised to give you a few pointers about reading faces. I used my own face to compare with the illustrations in the book, "Amazing Face Reading," by Mac Fulfer, J.D. Now, if you think I'm going to share my discoveries about myself with you, you are mistaken.

Every feature of your face tells a story, but I will only give you a summary. I used to lament the fact that my face was not symmetrical, but I have learned that that is normal. What Mr. Fulfer recommends is that you draw an imaginary straight line down the middle of your face. You should know that the left side of our faces "reflects our personal side or our inner thoughts and feelings" while the right side "reflects how you take yourself out into your external or business world." I can't tell you how many pages I read before I got that concept straight in my head.

Light and how it reflects our features tells a great deal about us as well. The way the face "reflects light reveals volumes about the subject's inner nature, and the way each facial feature reflects or responds to light indicates that feature's importance."

The shape of your foreheads tells how we think and address problems. For example, those who have straight foreheads, no angles or roundness, think logically and prefer to solve problems in sequential steps.

The shape of our eyebrows, the thickness of our eyebrows and their placement in relation to the eyes speaks to the face reader. Since my eyebrows are practically non-existent, I have always envied those with bushy eyebrows. People with full, thick eyebrows are constantly active mentally; they're full of thoughts and ideas and can be powerfully intellectual. Personally, I just thought they looked better; now I'll be paying more attention to people with thick eyebrows.

Let's move to the nose. Needless to say, the size and shape of the nose tells a great deal. Since our noses are so important to our continued existence, it should not be surprising to learn that "the nose gives insights about how we sustain ourselves and those around us. Your nose not only indicates the amount of energy available to you, but also shows your work style and how you handle money."

The only time I had issue with the results of reading my face was when I got to the information about the ears. I always thought I had small ears, but I didn't like the description of the attributes of people with small ears. Besides, I'm not so sure my ears are proportionally as small when compared to my head size as the book's illustration. "In face reading, ears indicate our learning style, or how we take in and process information: whether in an external, literal fashion or in an internal, intuitive style." Other factors to consider about our ears besides the size is the angle of their placement on the head, whether or not the inside portion protrudes, whether the ears are close to the head or not, whether the ear lobes are large or small and how the ears are placed on the face in relationship to the eyebrows.

The mouth is the next feature I wish to address. According to Mr. Fulfer, "this fascinating organ not only indicates our style of expressiveness, but also our degree of sensuality and even how we interpret what others tell us." Is your mouth large or small? Does it turn up or down or is it straight across? (Optimists have mouths that turn up.) Are your lips full or thin; is the upper lip larger or is the bottom lip larger? Those with full upper lips tend to be outspoken; those with full lower lips tend to be persuasive. Those with thin lips are cool and reserved.

Even our teeth tell a story. "In face reading, our teeth show how we make decisions and give some indications of personal strength and determination." For example, those with a gap between their front teeth are willing to take risks and make decisions intuitively. Those with large front teeth tend to be stubborn. Those with crooked teeth are able to see both sides of an issue. I could go on, but I think you get the picture.
