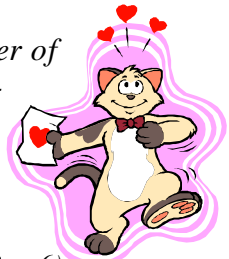
Guest Speaker

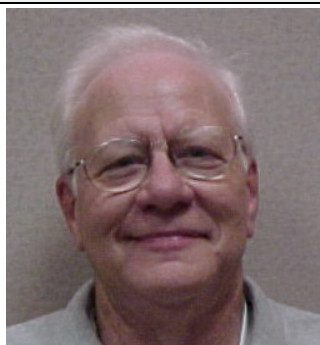

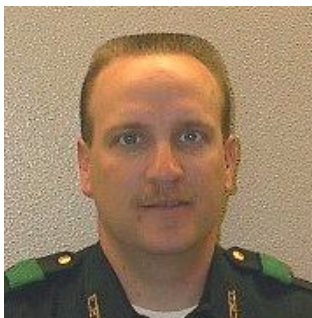

As you drive through South Euless Park today, you notice a very attractive "Old Iron Bridge" spanning the creek that borders the park. Most

Euless residents don't know what a long, colorful history the bridge has. Many have never seen it. The "Old Iron Bridge" was built in 1889 by the King Iron Bridge Company in Cleveland, Ohio. It was first erected over the Trinity River on the road now known as F.M. 157 allowing horse-drawn wagons to travel between eastern Tarrant County communities. In the early 1930's, the bridge was disassembled and moved to span Little Bear Creek on Euless-Grapevine Road, now known as North Main Street. The road improvements also included "paving" the dirt road with red gravel from the Morrison Farm nearby. The old bridge served Euless

for over 40 years. By the mid 1970's, the bridge had fallen into disrepair and its 14-foot width no longer provided for adequate traffic capacity. The City Council planned to replace the bridge with a wider, more modern bridge and scheduled construction to begin in late 1974. The old bridge was to be scrapped. Mr. Charles Hunt, whose home is on North Main near the bridge, began a campaign to save it. Hunt formed a "Save the Bridge" committee and convinced the Euless Bicentennial Steering Committee to adopt the bridge as a bicentennial project. Former Euless Mayor Warren Fuller joined the effort and secured funding from Tarrant County to move the old bridge from Little Bear Creek to its present location in South Euless Park in January 1975. The noble efforts of Mr. Hunt, Mr. Fuller and other Euless residents helped preserve a key piece of Euless history.

The erection of the old iron bridge and red gravel paving provided a major improvement for North Main Street in the

1930's. Today, seventy years later, Euless residents are beginning to see another major improvement for North Main Street. In 2002 right-of-way was acquired and several structures removed to make way for the new street. A major sign program replaced most of the pole signs with attractive monument signs. The unsightly overhead utility lines, which cluttered North Main, have been relocated. 2003 will bring the total reconstruction of North Main Street from S.H. 10 north to Harwood Road. The new street will be wider and safer with turn lanes, sidewalks, decorative lighting, new traffic signals and attractive landscaping.

In 1974 Mr. Hunt and Mr. Fuller went the extra mile to save the Old Iron Bridge. In 2003 we all need to go the extra mile to help the North Main merchants who will be impacted by the road construction process. Our continued patronage can make a difference for them.

Sure enough, there was nothing in the glove box.

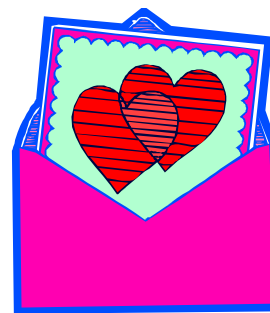
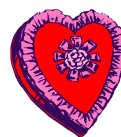
Captain: Would you mind opening your trunk? I was told you said there's a body in it.

Starting in January 2002, the State of Texas required that police agencies collect data relating to the race of people that are stopped on traffic or are ticketed for violations of the

law. In order to meet their requirements we had to make some changes to our citations and field interrogation cards to include whether a person had been searched and whether the search was consensual. Additionally we had to record if the search located any contraband or if an arrest was made.

We had to bring in a computer pro-



grammer to change the Courts format to accept the additional information. The programmer came and made the changes. He returned to fix a glitch in the programming and when he did it erased the first change he made. To make a long story short, all the data we were supposed to be collecting was lost. Since the State required that we have all this information, we had to hand count each citation issued and record the needed information. This was a pretty big chore seeing that there were over 20,000 citations to be checked.

We called on the Citizens Police Alumni to help and they came through like troopers! A job that could have taken a month or more was completed in just five days (I'm sure it seemed like more to

those who were there). I want to personally thank those who came to my aid. If not for your help I would still be in a back room somewhere sorting through those tickets.

A big thank you to: Jim Adair, J Benner, Byron Benoit, Dan Clark, John Erickson, Erlene Hill, Dave Miskin, Betty Overstreet, Chris Shannahan, Al Simmenroth, Paulette Tinker, Faye Stinnerford, Richard Zavala and Ruth Zavala. All together they donated over 75 hours to the cause. I know everyone was counting those tickets in their sleep!

It is great to have volunteers who lend a hand every time we call. I just want to say thanks for all you do!

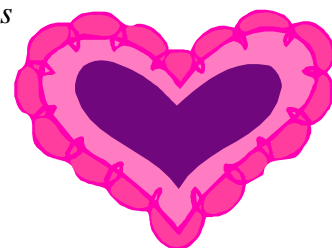
