THE DEFINITION OF ABUSE

Abuse is a pattern of coercive control that one person exercises over another. Battering is a behavior that physically harms, arouses fear, prevents a person from doing what they wish or forces them to behave in ways they do not want. Battering includes the use of physical and sexual violence, threats and intimidation, emotional abuse and economic deprivation.

The Hotline is provided by the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services and managed by the Texas Council on Family Violence

Services to victims of family violence are provided through contracts with family violence centers located throughout Texas. The shelter centers provide temporary shelter and nonresident services for victims of family violence and their children. The nonresidential centers provide the same services, except shelter, for victims. To be eligible for services, a client must be physically, emotionally, or sexually abused by a partner, former partner, or another family or household member. Information and referral also is available for the batterer. Services for victims of family violence include:

Temporary 24-hour-a-day shelter 24-hour hotline Information and referral to other services Legal advocacy Counseling Assistance in obtaining medical care Emergency transportation Information about training for and seeking employment.

Are You in an Abusive Relationship?

Does your partner:

1. Act extremely jealous of others who pay attention to you, or use jealousy to justify his/her actions?
2. Control your finances, behavior and even whom you socialize with?
3. Make you afraid by using looks, actions, and gestures like smashing things, destroying your property or displaying weapons?
4. Threaten to kill you or commit suicide?
5. Make all the decisions?
6. Stop you from seeing or talking to friends, family or limits your outside involvement?
7. Act like the abuse is no big deal, it's your fault or even deny doing it?
8. Threatens to kill your pets?
9. Puts you down in front of other people, humiliates you, plays mind games and makes you feel as if you are crazy?
10. Prevents you from getting or keeping a job?
11. Takes your money or does not let you know about or have access to the family income?
12. Threatens to take the children away?
13. Do you become quiet when he/she is around and feel afraid of making him/her angry?
14. Do you cancel plans at the last minute?
15. Do you stop seeing your friends and family members, becoming more and more isolated?
16. Do you find yourself explaining bruises to family or friends?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, you may be involved in a relationship that is physically, emotionally or sexually abusive.

A Guide for Family and Friends

Millions of American women are physically and emotionally abused by their husbands or partners each year. Recent statewide polling indicates that for most Texans, someone you know, your mom, sister, friend, coworker or neighbor is a victim of domestic violence. Your support and encouragement can be of tremendous value to a friend involved in an abusive relationship. You can ease the isolation and loss of control your friend may feel by listening, providing information on domestic violence, and helping to explore options.

Here are some possible signs that your friend is being abused and needs your help:

Does your friend have visible injuries, such as black eyes, bruises or broken bones? Do you tend not to press further about frequent "accidents" that cause absences from miss work?

Does your friend's partner exert an unusual amount of control over their activities? Are you reluctant to discuss his control over family finances, the way she dresses, and her contact with friends and family?

If your friend's partner ridicules her publicly, do you and others ignore this behavior? Do you already sense the volatile nature of these comments?

Have you noticed changes in your friend's or the children's behavior? Do they appear frightened, exhausted, or on edge? Do the children seem to be easily upset? Are they experiencing sudden problems in school or other activities?

What You Should Know About Domestic Violence

Domestic violence is not just a private family matter. It is a crime with serious repercussions for your loved one, her children and the entire community. Keeping quiet about what you observe could be very dangerous for your friend.

Domestic violence can involve threats, forced isolation, pushing, punching, slapping, choking, sexual assault and assault with weapons. It is rarely a one-time occurrence and usually escalates in frequency and severity over time.

Domestic violence can be deadly. Thirty percent of American women who are murdered are killed by their husbands or boyfriends.

Often, we are perplexed that someone who is abused doesn't simply walk out on her batterer. "Why didn't she leave?" is a common question concerning domestic violence and it is based on the false assumption that leaving always means safety.

Victims of domestic violence often remain in abusive relationships because of fear - fear for their lives, and fear for the safety of their children, fear of homelessness. Often the batterer is a parent and any decision to take children away from one of their parents is difficult. Often, a victim still feels strong emotional ties to her batterer. Sometimes religious or cultural values pressure a woman to keep the family together at all costs. The reality of domestic violence homicides, which often occur after a victim has left her abuser, means that leaving doesn't always mean safety.

Batterers typically make excuses for their violence, claiming loss of control due to alcohol or drug use or extreme stress. External factors like these do not cause domestic violence, although they may intensify already existing violent behavior. Batterers choose to use violence in order to control their partner. There is no excuse for abuse.

What you can do to help:

Break the Silence. Make the Call: Call the National Domestic Violence **Hotline (1-800-799-SAFE or TTY line for the Deaf 1-800-787-3224)** and talk to the staff about your concerns. They can put you in touch with programs and services in your area that assist victims of domestic violence and their children.

Be a Friend in Deed: Provide whatever you can: transportation, child care, financial assistance. Your friend may need to rely on family or friends for temporary housing. *Be very careful when offering and providing safety in your home. A domestic violence victim frequently faces the most physical danger when attempting to flee.* Be very discreet and talk to a local domestic violence program about the best way to handle this.

Report any Emergency: It cannot be overemphasized that domestic violence is a crime that can result in serious physical injury and even death. If you know that a battering incident is occurring, call the police immediately. Calling the police does not always mean the abuser will be put in jail. It is simply the most effective way to protect the victim and children from immediate harm.

Remember that your first step to helping your friend is to "**Break the Silence. Make the Call.**" Listen, Learn and Help. You can make a difference.

He shared many tips on self awareness and tactics to practice that we will hopefully never need. He even brought along a dummy to practice on. Guess he didn't trust us.

We had a short recess for social time and resumed the meeting at 8:30 PM. Lou presented David Bolger with a "Done Good Award". Lou announced J.R. and Kay Goad will be celebrating their 50-year anniversary next weekend. To help celebrate, a cake was presented for all to enjoy. Congratulations to the Goads!!

Approval for January minutes made by Tim Stinneford. Second by J.R. Goad, passed.

Approval for January treasurers report made by Tim Stinneford. Second by J.R. Goad, passed.

Discussion was held regarding treasurers report not reporting current balance. Rose-Marie stated it is an activity report for the month. Everyone has a copy of the Budget; so currently we will keep reporting monthly activity.

Lou mentioned added income not previously included in Budget. Bass Pro Christmas gift-wrapping \$895.00 and Wal-Mart donation of \$500.00.

Lou thanked Cindy Carter and Karen Duncan for working on the newsletter.

Executive Board approved the purchase of Crime Zone CAD zone for \$598.00 and Mantis-Microscope for \$2195.00 FOR A TOTAL OF \$2793.00. 


COP UPDATE


