## Letter from the Chief

Dear friends,

We enjoyed the third annual hamburger cookout for your alumni association. It was a great opportunity for us to tell and show all of you how much we appreciate what you do for us. We also enjoy all the good food, drinks and dessert too!

We will be began a new budget year on the first of October. In this coming budget we have some new equipment that should assist our people in doing their jobs. We budgeted to upgrade our radio console bays. We upgraded the radio console infrastructure last year and when that was completed we found our equipment bays no longer fit right. We will be modifying those equipment bays to fit and look professional.

We are also purchasing a new Ford Expedition for the Crime Scene Technician assigned to CID to work out of. We will equip the vehicle to have all the forensic equipment to properly process major crime scenes. When it is not being used by the CID CST it will be available for the CST assigned to patrol to use. We hope our evidence collection capability will be greatly enhanced by the addition of this equipment.

As we have increased the number of investigators to Criminal investigations we have not increased the size of their vehicle fleet. Investigators requested more cars to allow them to make field follow ups without have to hunt vehicles. To assist with this problem two unmarked vehicles will be added to the CID fleet with money from our seized narcotics account.

So even in a year of tight budgets we were able to obtain some valuable equipment to help our officers do their job.



Standing Committee reports:

Lou mentioned the report that Leah Benoit puts out each month with all the volunteer hours. Last month we had 250 hours.

## PROTECTIVE OR RESTRAINING... the benefits of these orders

What is the difference between a protective order and a restraining order?

Both types of orders can direct a person to stay away from your home and place of employment and to not be violent with you. However, only a protective order is criminally enforceable, meaning that the abuser can be arrested and charged with a criminal offense for violating the order. The police cannot arrest someone for violating a restraining order; you must go back to the judge who issued the restraining order to enforce it.

A protective order is a civil court order issued to prevent continuing acts of family violence.

Family violence is basically defined as any act by one member of a family or household intended to physically harm another member, a serious threat of physical harm, or the abuse of a child. Family includes blood relatives or relatives by marriage, former spouses, parents (married or not) of the same child, foster parents and foster children, or any member or former member of a household (people living in the same house, related or not).

A protective order may prohibit the offender from: committing further acts of family violence, harassing or threatening the victim, either directly or indirectly by communicating the threat through another person, or going to or near a school or day-care center that a child protected under the order attends.

When requesting a Protective Order, unless a later date is requested by the applicant, the court shall set a hearing date no later than 14 days after the application is filed. If, however, the court finds from the information contained in the application that there is a clear and present danger of family violence, the court may immediately issue a temporary *ex parte* order. The temporary order is valid for up to 20 days. Final protective orders are effective for up to one year.

If the Protective Order is violated, call the police immediately!! Remember, protective orders do not offer complete protection. No piece of paper can protect you from all instances of violence. Law enforcement agencies are notified of all protective orders issued in their area and they are required to maintain a

list of those orders. If an offender violates the order and law enforcement is notified, officials will act to arrest the offender and seek to have charges filed. If a person violates the protective order in the presence of law enforcement, the offender must be arrested immediately. In cases of violation of a protective order, excluding *ex parte* orders, the offender may be punished by a fine of as much as \$4,000 or jail for up to one year or both. In cases involving the violation of an *ex parte* order, the offender may be punished for contempt of court with a fine of as much as \$500 or up to six months in jail or both.

Remember, if someone has physically assaulted or threatened you, contact your local police department or sheriff's office to press charges against that person. Even if you are ineligible for a protective order, you may be able to have the person arrested for assault, criminal trespass, or stalking.

- Walk, slither, and sneak on sidewalks, not in the street
